Salta Lithium Project Exploration Update

The Directors of PepinNini Lithium Ltd(PNN, the Company) report that one borehole has been completed on the Company's **Rincon Project**. Brine was recorded from 1m and the borehole total depth is 80m. Packer testing for brine sampling is currently underway.

Lithologies intersected are halite(rock salt) and black unconsolidated sands. Both lithologies appear to be saturated and density readings taken are consistent with brine. Samples will be sent to a certified laboratory and results are expected before the end of the year. The borehole will be completed as a monitoring well to support further sampling and pumping testing depending on results.

Site preparation is underway for a second borehole further north on the salar as per location plan below.





Figure 1 - Rincon Salar Borehole Locations



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The roadway for the Company's **Pular Project** has been completed to allow stable access for heavy drilling equipment and fuel. Construction of a field camp is underway for a drilling program of up to four holes to a maximum depth of 250m to commence in January 2018.
